

Services:

Plant Diagnostics Laboratory, *UMass Extension*. Serves farmers, greenhouse producers, landscape contractors, turf managers, arborists, nurseries, and others in agriculture and the green industries.

Soil and Plant Nutrient Testing Laboratory, *UMass Extension*. Public service provides soil and plant nutrient testing.

<u>iTree</u>, Tools for Assessing and Managing Forests and Community Trees. This is a state-of-the-art, peer-reviewed software suite from the USDA Forest Service that provides urban and rural forestry analysis and benefits assessment tools.

Tree ID Tools:

Leafsnap, Leafsnap is a series of electronic field guides being developed by researchers from *Columbia University*, the *University of Maryland*, and the *Smithsonian Institution*. The free mobile apps use visual recognition software to help identify tree species from photographs of their leaves. They contain beautiful high-resolution images of leaves, flowers, fruits, petioles, seeds, and bark.


- **Green School**, A comprehensive 12-day certificate short course for horticultural professionals who wish to gain an understanding of economically feasible and environmentally responsible plant and land care practices and the relation of those practices to the protection of the environment.
- Landscape, Nursery & Urban Forestry
 Program, UMass Extension Landscape, Nursery and
 Urban Forestry Team works closely with the <u>UMass</u>
 <u>Extension Turf Team</u> to educate landscape, nursery
 and turf professionals by providing programs and
 research-based information on the best
 horticultural practices and technology for
 environmental stewardship in nursery and landscape
 management.
- Annual Community Tree Conference, This oneday conference is designed for tree care professionals, volunteers, and enthusiasts including arborists, tree wardens, urban foresters, foresters, landscape architects and shade tree committee members.

Tree Steward Training, Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation Urban & Community Forestry Program. Check for current offerings. Tree Steward Training is offered by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation's Bureau of Forest Fire Control and Forestry's Urban and Community Forestry Program, the USDA Forest Service, and the Massachusetts Tree Wardens and Foresters Association.

Funding:

Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation Urban & Community Forestry Program, Assists communities and nonprofit groups in protecting, growing, and managing community trees and forests with grant programs, technical assistance and training across all Massachusetts.









- Community Forest Grant Program, US Forest Service competitive grant program whereby local governments, qualified nonprofit organizations, and Indian tribes are eligible to apply for grant funding to establish community forests.
- Community Forestry Challenge Grants, Annual grant opportunity for municipalities and nonprofit groups in Massachusetts to improve and protect their urban forests. These 50/50 matching grants help develop, grow, and sustain programs that plant, protect, and maintain a community's public tree resources and develop partnerships with residents and community institutions.
- Urban and Community Forestry National Grid Partnership Challenge Grant, Grants are offered to specific municipalities in which National Grid has completed their ACT Reliability Improvement Program. These grants are made for the purposes of community tree replacement planting and building local capacity for excellent urban and community forestry.
- **Urban and Community Forestry Eversource Partnership Challenge Grant**, Eversource Energy is offering matching grants to municipalities within their service territory. These grants are made for the purposes of community tree planting and building local capacity for excellent urban and community forestry.

New England Chapter Arbor Day Grant, *Arbor Day Foundation*. This grant awards up to \$1,000.00 to a municipality, non-profit organization, or institution that demonstrates the need to promote and support their Arbor Day celebration.



In 2020, TickTalk featured exciting guest speakers on tick topics that included seasonality and life stages of ticks (key to planning intervention and prevention), emerging or invasive tick species, how ticks use vegetation and leaf litter throughout their life cycle, increasing fears of Alpha-gal allergies (allergies to certain meat and animal-related products), dispelling myths of tick control, and many more.



2019. We can only conjecture you've heard it before- 'right plant,
right place'. This type of proactive planning is a powerful strategy,
critical to creating and maintaining a healthy urban forest. A
well-placed tree has the ability to provide a number of ecological,
economic, and societal benefits throughout its lifetime. Trees
reduce atmospheric carbon dioxide, levels of airborne pollutants,
air temperature, stormwater runoff and flooding, and provide
other critical ecological services. Trees contribute economically
by boosting property values and fostering energy savings from
nearby buildings. Within cities, trees increase people's feelings of
well-being, minimize noise, and reduce crime. Trees are a growing
investment, and over time generate their benefits in greater
magnitude as they increase in size and stature.
